It's the Year of the Owl

Many owls were observed in Six Ponds neighborhoods this spring. A nesting pair of Great Horned Owls (Bubo virginianis) in the Bloody Pond area produced two owlets, one of which fell out of the nest and then made a temporary home on a brush pile. Luckily, both parents kept a close eye on the owlet that fell out of the nest and were able to care and feed it for a couple of weeks until it produced enough feathers to enable it to fly back up to the nest. Amazing!

Also seen and heard on the ponds were Eastern Screech-owl pairs (Megascops asia) at Pinewoods Camp, Barred Owls (Strix varia), and another pair of Great Horned Owls on Long Pond.
