Acorns- a Wildlife Buffet

Fall is acorn time in southeast Massachusetts. They are an essential food source for many animals including deer, squirrels and birds. Oak trees have an irregular cycle when it comes to producing acorns. Mast years (considered a boom year of acorn production) happen every 2 to 3 years with the production of smaller acorns. Autumn is the typical period when we start seeing endless amounts of acorns falling to the ground. While this is not a mast year it's fun to see the varieties of white, black, and scarlet oak acorns falling in our woods. Learn more here.

Drought or Just Dry Weather?

Our woods are really dry right now. Have you noticed? While Plymouth is not officially in a drought, according to the experts we are are currently in what is called an "abnormally dry zone". Details here. <u>https://www.drought.gov/</u><u>states/massachusetts/county/plymouth</u>


There have been at least 106 brush and and wildland fires across our state in the past three weeks, burning over 600 acres. Some of these are still burning!

How to prevent brush fires:

As fires continue to burn, the <u>Department of Fire Services</u> is asking people to take precautions. Here are their tips for preventing fires:

- Do not burn leaves. (Open burning is prohibited through January)
- Refrain from outdoor cooking and heating.
- Use caution with lawnmowers, leaf blowers and other power equipment as engines can get hot enough to ignite dry leaves.
- Dump ashes from fireplaces and wood stoves in a metal can, douse them with water, and cover them with a tight-fitting lid.
- Extinguish smoking materials in an ashtray with water or sand.

Take EXTREME care with any outdoor fire pits and continue to follow protocols as outlined in our neighborhood <u>Firewise program</u>.



Move any flammable material away from wall exteriors - mulch, flammable plants, leaves and needles, firewood piles - anything that can burn
Remove anything stored underneath decks or porches
